



Collective Bargaining News: 3rd Quarter 2017

Wage Negotiations

- Germany: All blue and white-collar workers in car repair shops will get wage increases in two steps of 5.8 % (in total) over the next two years. <u>Read more</u>
- Serbia: Trade unions' calls for negotiations on decent wages and working conditions at Fiat's plant in Serbia were finally heard. An agreement was concluded on 25 July 2017 after three weeks of strike action and mobilisation. <u>Read more</u>

Trade Union Actions

Portugal: Workers from the Portuguese Volkswagen factory went on strike on 30 August 2017 in order to protest against plans from the side of the company to introduce work on Saturdays. <u>Read more</u>

European Union policies

- The European Commission is planning to set up a European Labour Authority, according to Mr. Juncker. This plan has yet to be specified in detail. <u>Read more</u>
- The European Commission launched a second-stage consultation on the Written Statement Directive. Commissioner Thyssen claims that she wants all workers across the EU to be clearly covered by the basic rules, independent of their employment status. <u>Read more</u>

- Eurostat: The EU annual inflation was 1.7% in August 2017. A year earlier the rate was 0.3%. <u>Read more</u>
- Eurostat: GDP rose by 0.7% in the EU during the second quarter of 2017. Compared with the same quarter of the previous year, GDP grew by 2.4%. <u>Read more</u>
- Eurostat: The number of persons employed in the EU increased by 0.4% in the second quarter of 2017. Compared with 2016, the growth was 1.5%. <u>Read more</u>

Legal issues

- The European Court of Human Rights has sided with a Romanian employee in a case of great significance. The Court found that his employer's monitoring of his Internet use at work violated his right to privacy. (Majority ruling after appeal). <u>Read more</u>
