



Collective Bargaining News: 1st Quarter 2018

Wage Negotiations

- Germany: In early February 2018, IG Metall signed a landmark agreement in the metal and electrical sector. The agreement combines pay rise, working time flexibility and special arrangements for carers. <u>Read more</u>, also <u>here</u>
- Turkey: Metalworkers managed to negotiate an astonishing 25% wage increase despite their strike having been banned by the government. <u>Read more</u>

Trade Union Actions

- France: The most wide-ranging strikes for decades will take place in France this spring. Trade unions and students continue to protest President Emmanuel Macron's reform agenda. <u>Read more</u>
- Spain: On 8 March 2018, millions of Spanish women joined an unprecedented, nationwide strike to call for equality. The walkouts lasted for 24 hours. <u>Read more</u>
- Spain: On 17 March 2018, tens of thousands of retirees and unions rallied across the country to demand better pensions and to avoid privatisation of retirement benefits. <u>Read more</u>

European Policies

- The EU: On 19 March 2018, a trilogue agreement was struck on the revision of the Posting of Workers Directive. The compromise, which still needs to be formally adopted by the EU institutions, contains several, significant improvements. <u>Read more</u>
- The European Commission: On 13 March 2018, a Social Fairness Package was published. The proposal has two elements, a European Labour Authority and a regulation on access to social protection for all. <u>Read more</u>

Economic and social data

Eurostat: EU inflation was 1.3% in February 2018, down from 2.0% in February 2017. Prices increased most in Romania with 3.8%. Only one Member State still has deflation (Cyprus). <u>Read more</u>

Legal issues

The Court of Justice of the EU: On-call time is working time, even when the worker is at home, if the worker has to be able to respond to a call from the employer immediately and if s/he has very significantly restricted opportunities for other activities. (Case C-518/15). <u>Read more</u>
