Re: Urgent EU intervention needed to save 4,000 steel jobs at ISD Dunaferr (Hungary)

Dear Ambassador Ódor,

We are writing to you as the Ambassador of the Hungarian Permanent Representation to the EU to ask for the Hungarian Government to urgently investigate, and intervene, into the business conduct and lack of respect for workers' rights at ISD Dunaferr, stressing the importance of the steel works to the local community and well as the strategic importance of European steel for the EU's strategic autonomy.

ISD Dunaferr is estimated to employ around **4,000 workers**, with more employed in the supply chain, and its continuation is of vital importance to the lives of the citizens of Dunaujváros and for the local economy. We would like to raise some serious issues which we believe should be investigated immediately by the Hungarian Government.

Firstly, a court ruling has found that since the end of 2020, IDS Dunaferr has **functioned outside national legal regulations**. The company's CEO, board of directors and supervisory board are not officially registered at the court, and the court has not received the financial reports adopted by the general meeting for the years 2019, 2020 and 2021.

Secondly, in August 2020, the **company unilaterally decided to suspend the valid collective agreement** which a subsequent court decision ruled as invalid, as the CEO in place was not appropriately registered. Our trade union affiliate, VASAS, requested negotiations with the management, but as there was no reaction, filed a complaint, demanding that the collective agreement must be respected and that the workers must receive their agreed wages and allowances. This complaint is currently being investigated and the trade union is collecting workers' signatures to launch a class action lawsuit.

Thirdly, since the end of 2019, the **trade union has been denied access to the site** even after winning a lawsuit to ensure access. This terrible treatment of trade union representatives at ISD Dunaferr is not new, and we have <u>previously reported</u> on the unjustified dismissals of trade union representatives there.

Fourthly, the **production of high-quality European steel is crucial for European infrastructure** and for producing vital equipment to meet the EU's Green Deal ambitions, such as wind turbines. Russia's illegal invasion of Ukraine has highlighted the need for Europe to increase its strategic autonomy, especially in relation to strategically important sectors such as steel. However, the energy and raw material crises, which are impacting energy-intensive industries across Europe, are being particularly felt at ISD Dunaferr and there are <u>concerns that the second blast furnace could be closed</u>, with production stopped completely.



We continue to <u>call for EU action</u> to ensure that EU industry and its workers do not fall victim to the energy crisis, and we ask the Hungarian Government to engage with trade unions, employers and the European Commission to safeguard energy-intensive industries and protect jobs.

In conclusion, the situation facing workers at ISD Dunaferr, and the local community, is extremely concerning. The company does not appear to be working within the national legal business framework, and EU working rights, including on information and consultation, are not being respected. We ask the Hungarian Government to launch an investigation into the functioning of ISD Dunaferr and to support the steel workers at the site.

We have also contacted Commissioners Breton and Schmit to raise our concerns.
